Alizan Mahadi Senior director (research), ISIS Malaysia

Dr Munir is currently the chairman of Asean Business Advisory Council, Malaysia, CARI Asean Research and Advocacy, and president of the Asean Business Club. He also sits on the board of the Institute of Strategic and International Studies (ISIS) Malaysia, is board chairman of the Institute for Capital Market Research Malaysia (ICMR) and is on the honorary council of advisers for EUROCHAM Malaysia. He is an active advocate of deeper Asean economic integration.





SESSION 1

The NSP as sustained partnership between Malaysia and ROK

The New Southern Policy would have brought positive changes to Malaysia-ROK relations. As the NSP hits a five-year mark, identifying areas of priorities to adjust or revise could build sustained relations. These include institutionalisation of the NSP, Southeast Asia's participation in peace in the Korean Peninsula and areas for future collaboration. The NSP-Plus is unfolding against shifting strategic circumstances in the region, such as access to vaccines, enhanced alliances and major power competition.

- What is the strategic outlook for Malaysia and ROK, which could prompt strategic convergence in the mid to long term?
- What are the mechanisms to ensure sustained NSP presence and areas of priorities?
- Is there a possibility for cooperation to bring peace in the Korean Peninsula or Asean? Could there be cooperation in traditional or non-traditional security areas?







Special address 1

Tan Sri Dr Jemilah Mahmood

Professor and director, Sunway Centre for Planetary Health in Malaysia

Dr Jemilah is a medical professional with more than 20 years' experience managing crises in health, disasters and conflict settings. She is currently professor and director of the newly established Sunway Centre for Planetary Health. She is also the pro-chancellor of Herriot-Watt University Malaysia. She served as special adviser to the prime minister on public health from April 2020-September 2021. She was also a member of the government's Economic Action Council and sits on the Malaysian Climate Action Council and Consultative Council for Foreign Policy.

Dr Lee is a senior fellow and director of the External Relations Department at the Asan Institute for Policy Studies. Lee focuses on Southeast Asian politics and international relations, East Asian regional cooperation, and non-traditional and human security issues. His recent publications include South Korea and The South China Sea (2016), A South Korean Perspective on the Potential Contributions and Limitations of the ADMM-Plus (2016), and What Asia Wants from the US: Voices from the Region (2018).

Dr Kim is an associate professor in the Department of International Relations at Yonsei University Wonju Campus. Before joining Yonsei University, he served as an assistant professor in the Department of International Relations at Changwon National University and as a senior lecturer in the Department of Southeast Asian Studies, Universiti Malaya. His research areas include Asean and East Asian regionalism. He has authored a number of journal articles and presented papers at domestic and international conferences on regionalism and normative matters in international relations.





SESSION 2

The NSP-Plus, Malaysia and a recovery

After a pandemic-dominated 2020, the end of 2021 sees South Korea and Malaysia presenting recovery programmes. South Korea's New Deal focuses on job creation through investments in digitalisation, including green and emerging technologies. Malaysia unveiled recovery plans, such as Penjana, Permai and the 12th Malaysia Plan. MP12 focuses on eight sectors inclusive of electrical and electronics, creative, tourism, smart farming and halal. Areas for greater cooperation include exchanges in digital economy and cultural diplomacy.

- How are Malaysia and ROK managing the Covid-19 recovery and are there challenges for its execution?
- Are there best practices that can be learned from South Korea's experience?

Fabian Bigar

CEO, Strategic Change Management Office (MyDIGITAL), Economic Planning Unit, Prime Minister's Department

Bigar assumed the CEO post at SCMO in April 2021. The mandate for the SCMO is to drive change management and ensure the successful delivery of the Malaysia Digital Economy Blueprint. The office also serves as the main secretariat for the National Digital Economy and 4IR Council. His previous assignments include undersecretary for policy and international relations in the Health Ministry, director of the Civil Service Delivery Unit in the Prime Minister's Department and director for the National Key Economic Area – Healthcare and Low-Income Households in the Performance Management and Delivery Unit (Pemandu).

Dr Zokhri has held some academic positions in international relations (IR) research and teaching, serving as the deputy dean of student affairs at Management and Science University. His area of research focuses on the changing nature of diplomacy and sovereignty of developing nations, especially Malaysia. This led to the establishment of Eirene Research to explore leadership and diplomacy in IR. He co-founded ARUS, an avenue to nurture talents and empowerment for Malaysian youth. He is now the director of external relations at the Institute for Democracy and Economic Affairs, Malaysia (IDEAS).



Dr Ko Young Kyung

Senior research fellow, Institute of Social Sciences, Seoul National University

Dr Ko is currently a senior research fellow at the Institute of Social Sciences, Seoul National University and adjunct senior lecturer, Sunway University Business School in Malaysia. She is the author of Asean Super App War and Future Growth Market Asean, which are the first Korean books to analyse tech firms and business environment and market trends with many business cases in Asean. She has conducted research on directors' remuneration, corporate reforms and mutual fund performance in Malaysia and has extended her research work across the whole area of emerging and frontier markets.



Dr Danial Mohd Yusof

Associate professor, Kulliyyah of Islamic Revealed Knowledge and Human Sciences, International Islamic University Malaysia

Dr Danial is associate professor at the Department of Political Science, Kulliyyah of Islamic Revealed Knowledge and Human Sciences, IIUM. He is chief editor of Intellectual Discourse Journal of IIUM, and an editorial board member of Jurnal Parlimen Malaysia and Al-Shajarah Journal. He is also principal researcher for the Extremism Analytical Research Unit and project leader of the award-winning flagship project on peacebuilding and civilisational development or 2LEAD4PEACE. The project focuses on creating platform, bridging the gap and capacity building for PCVE (preventing and countering violent extremism) stakeholders. Danial is also Malaysian coordinator for collaborative research between IIUM and the National Consortium for the Study of Terrorism and Responses to Terrorism, University of Maryland.
