

This session delves into the ADMM and ADMM-Plus frameworks, evaluating their impact on and contribution to regional stability amid

## Navigating technological advancements: implications for climate action and resource security

long shaped national Technologies have climate policies. commitments to international frameworks and net-zero aspirations. However, the emergence of new technologies calls for a deeper examination of how they interact with climate policy frameworks. In addition to clean energy solutions, these include high-risk technologies like carbon capture, utilisation and storage (CCUS), and investments in data centres and artificial intelligence that have implications for resource security. #### Sinking trust in troubled waters: geopolitical uncertainty in Asia-Pacific

Grand Ballroom, Level 6

The Asia-Pacific region is undergoing enormous changes, marked by shifting alliances, rising tensions and evolving security challenges. The uncertainty is also driven by rapid economic growth, increasing competition and heightened public awareness of and assertiveness towards many sensitive occurrences beyond national borders. Flashpoints like South China Sea, the Korean Peninsula, Myanmar and Indo-Pacific remain critical concerns. This session focuses on long-term influences on conflict, cooperation and competition. How do shifting alliances and rivalries influence regional security? What strategies can be implemented to foster trust among nations, considering escalating tensions and competition between major powers? What lessons can be learned from past conflicts and cooperation efforts in the region that could inform current security strategies?

Bomassi's research focuses on European foreign policy towards the Indo-Pacific. Prior to that, she contributed to founding an international task force on preventive diplomacy and establishing a global Parliamentarians' Network on Conflict Prevention. In the early 2000s, she worked for Save the Children in Afghanistan and Pakistan. She is the editor of the report 'Reimagining EU-ASEAN Relations: Challenges and Opportunities' and co-author of *The Southern Mirror: Reflections on Europe from the Global South*.

She is a former minister counsellor at the Vietnam Embassy in the US. Duong is the author and co-author of several books and has published many articles in foreign newspapers and other publications.
